SUBJECT:

Consideration of a Resolution accepting a grant award for \$110,000 from the State of California Office of Traffic Safety and amending the FY 2019/20 Budget.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that Council adopt the attached resolution approving the grant award under the Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP) and amend the City FY 2019/20 Budget as related to this grant award.

SUMMARY:

The State of California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) sponsors several grant programs in an effort to improve the safety of the state's streets and highways. The City applied for assistance to address these issues in our community and recently received official confirmation that our grant application was successful. As a result, the OTS has awarded the Madera Police Department with a grant for \$110,000 to provide funding for our successful anti-DUI program.

DISCUSSION:

The Selective Traffic Enforcement Program focuses on a comprehensive approach to enforce and encourage compliance with seat belt use, impaired driving, speed limit, and other traffic laws. Education and enforcement are two very important components of collision reduction. The acceptance of the STEP grant will allow the Madera Police Department to bolster its enforcement and education efforts in all of the problem areas mentioned.

The grant award for \$110,000 will allow the Madera Police Department to perform overtime operations related to DUI checkpoints and saturation patrols as well as traffic enforcement operations linked to distracted driving and primary collision factors. These comprehensive

programs have a long-lasting impact in reducing fatal and injury collisions. The grant will also allow us to purchase electronic citation data collection devices that will allow our officers to be more expedient in issuing citations and reducing the use of triplicate paper forms. Lastly, the grant will also fund expenses related to training personnel to identifying persons under the influence.

Given the highly competitive nature of this program, Staff believes our community should be particularly gratified by the success of being awarded. The City has previously been awarded an Office of Traffic Safety grant and has successfully managed the award activities. Therefore, staff urges Council to accept the Selective Traffic Enforcement Program grant in the amount of \$110,000 and approve the budget amendment to use these funds for the approved activities.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

Acceptance of the Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP) award will provide \$110,000 in funding to support our community's law enforcement services. It will assist with the Police Departments expenditures for the enforcement of persons driving under the influence and enforcement operations focusing on primary collision factors.

1. PROBLEM STATEMENT

The City of Madera is a small community which is located along the SR 99 corridor. With a population of approximately 63,000 people, during the wee, that population can swell to upwards of 80,000. With the increase number of the populous, the number of distracted driving, excessive speed, and impaired driving collisions increase and affect the quality of life within the community.

In 2017 the City of Madera had 178 injury collisions which resulted in 235 victims. Driving while under the influence of alcohol or drug was the primary collision factor for 18% of all the collisions in 2015. Eighty five percent of the collisions occur in Madera during the daylight hours.

The number of collisions has increased over the past three years as the community has gain in population as well as commercial growth. Resources have been utilized to target "Hot Spot" collisions areas when call volume permits such action.
